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Doc Schlichter

It's likely that nobody put their stamp on Chambersburg athletics more than Lowell "Doc" Schlichter.

When he began his term of 33 years as the CASHS athletic director, the school offered only two sports – football and basketball. When Schlichter retired from that post in 1974, there were 34 interscholastic sports for boys and girls.

A CASHS graduate, Schlichter returned to Chambersburg after graduating from Gettysburg College and made his mark as the head coach of the boys basketball program. He coached the Trojans from 1940 to 1963, and in those 23 years, his teams were 387-113, for an impressive winning percentage of .774.

Chambersburg collected 5 District 3 championships under Schlichter. His best team may have been in 1943-44, when the Trojans had the school's only undefeated regular season (20-0) and won a district crown. They fell to defending state champion Lower Merion in the PIAA quarterfinals, 31-30.

His final team in 1963-64, went 20-2.

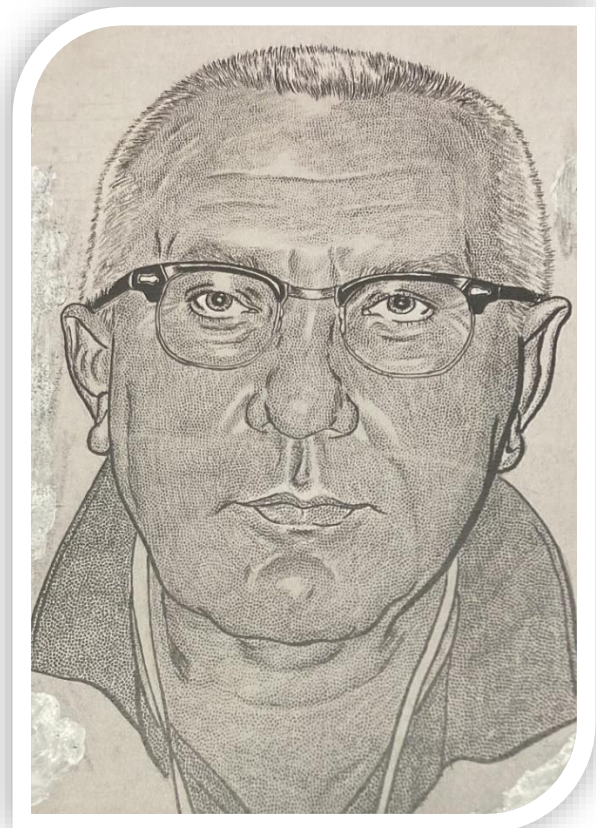
Schlichter also officiated PIAA events in football, basketball and track & field, was a lieutenant in the U.S. Navy during World War II, coached one year of football for CASHS (the team went 7-1-1 in 1943) and was a high school guidance counselor.

In addition to helping Chambersburg's athletic department grow considerably, Schlichter was the driving force behind organizing the SCAL (South Central Athletic League), which was the precursor to the current Mid Penn Conference.

Partly for his work in that league's formation, Schlichter was named Pennsylvania State Athletic Director of the Year in 1975.

He passed away in 1977 at the age of 67.

Dave Myers

He may have a common name, but the legacy left by Dave Myers as an athlete at Chambersburg was nothing but uncommon.

Myers was a standout athlete in four sports for the Trojans before graduating in 1966, and he led a very interesting life after his playing days were over.

Myers filled his high school years with sports, playing three years of football in the fall, basketball in the winter and both baseball and track & field in the spring.

On the court, Myers scored over 1,000 points in his career – he was the first in Trojan history to do so. His 50-point game still stands as the school record single-game scoring mark, as does his school record 39 rebounds in one game.

His hoops career was highlighted by being selected to play in the Dapper Dan Classic All-Star game in Pittsburgh.

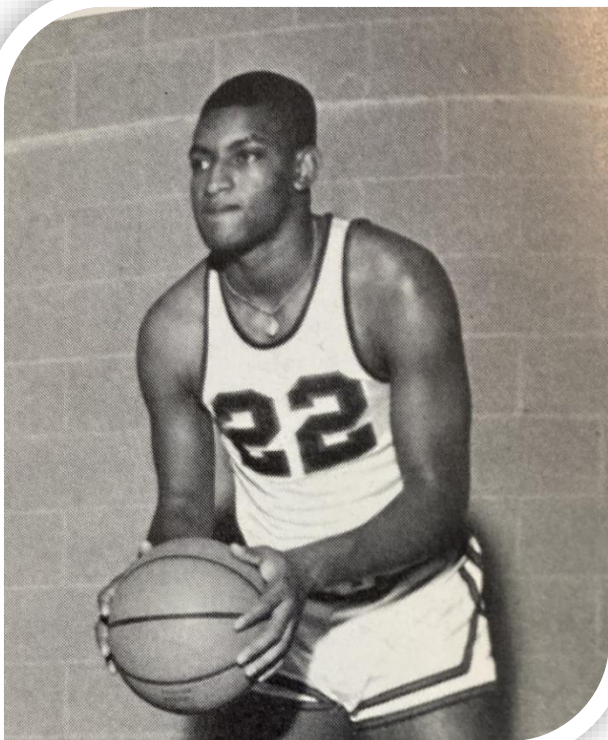
Myers said fellow Trojan athletes Barry Carter, Jay Green, Duffy Burns, Keyser Crittendon and Louis Myers were a great help to his career.

Myers played shortstop in baseball, was drafted by the Philadelphia Phillies and played for two years in the Phillies' minor league system.

He was drafted into the Marine Corps in 1967 and served for 13 months in Vietnam. He was declared MIA in August of 1968, but returned home in March of 1969.

Myers then spent 25 years with the Metro Police Department in Washington, D.C. before retiring as a homicide detective in 1995. He currently lives in North Carolina.

Bob Thomas

It's not a difficult chore to show why Bob Thomas belongs in the inaugural class of the Chambersburg Athletics Hall of Fame.

His list of accomplishments as the Trojans' baseball coach is impressive, to say the least:

- Thomas was the CASHS head baseball coach for 51 seasons. Especially in the time frame he was coaching, that's nearly unheard of to last that many years.
- Incredibly, in those 51 seasons, only two times did the Trojans not compile a winning record. One year they were .500, the other year they were 10-11.
- During his tenure at Chambersburg, his teams racked up 833 victories and just 279 defeats. That's a winning percentage of .749.
- The Trojans were nearly always the preseason pick to win a league championship, and they did so 22 times under Thomas.
- There were no District 3 or PIAA tournaments when Thomas began coaching, but once they arrived, Chambersburg was usually a contender. The Trojans earned 11 District 3 titles and were state champions three times – in 1984, 1999 and 2004.
- Although it could not be verified, it is believed that no baseball coach in Pennsylvania has more wins than Thomas.



High school baseball did not have postseason tournaments until 1977, and perhaps some of Thomas's most talented teams never had a chance to compete for a title. Those same players, however, did fare well at state American Legion tournaments and Thomas was also the coach for them.

In 1979, Chambersburg reached the PIAA championship game for the first time, but was edged by State College, 2-1.

The first state crown was captured in 1984 with a 3-1 win over Central Martinsburg in the final. In 1999, the Trojans won PIAA gold by holding off Shaler, 4-3. And in 2004, CASHS ripped Peters Township 12-5 for its final championship.

Chambersburg reached the PIAA semifinals three other times during Thomas's coaching days.

When asked about his success, Thomas would always say that his teams could not have won that many games unless they had a lot of great players. Over the years, two Chambersburg players reached the Major Leagues – Ike Brookens and Tom Brookens – and another 19 players played ball in the minor leagues.

Thomas was also Chambersburg's head basketball coach for several years and in his playing days as a Trojan, he was an above-average athlete.

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Marcia Brown

If you were to look for a pioneer of girls athletics at Chambersburg, look no further than Marcia (Logue) Brown.

She was directly or indirectly responsible for starting three girls sports programs, coached two of them and was a coach in two other sports.

Brown was hired as a permanent substitute at CASHS in January of 1970 after graduating from Penn State University. By the fall of 1970, she became a Physical Education and Health teacher at Chambersburg.

She got into coaching with the Trojan junior varsity field hockey team in her first year and stayed with that team for 15 seasons, compiling a record of 76-28-18.

Brown then picked up coaching the junior varsity basketball team for four years and ran up a record of 29-3. That led to her taking over as the basketball team's head coach for 10 years.

Longtime friend Cheryl Reed and Brown saw some interest for gymnastics, so they set up an exhibition at CASHS for two years before gymnastics was recognized as a sport by the PIAA, and the Trojans had a successful gymnastics team for many years.

In 1975, Brown started a girls track & field team, and coached the team for two years before handing it off to fellow Hall of Famer Tim Cook.

Brown then turned to her favorite sport – softball – and created a new Chambersburg team on the diamond.

She also played and coached softball in local amateur leagues for many years.

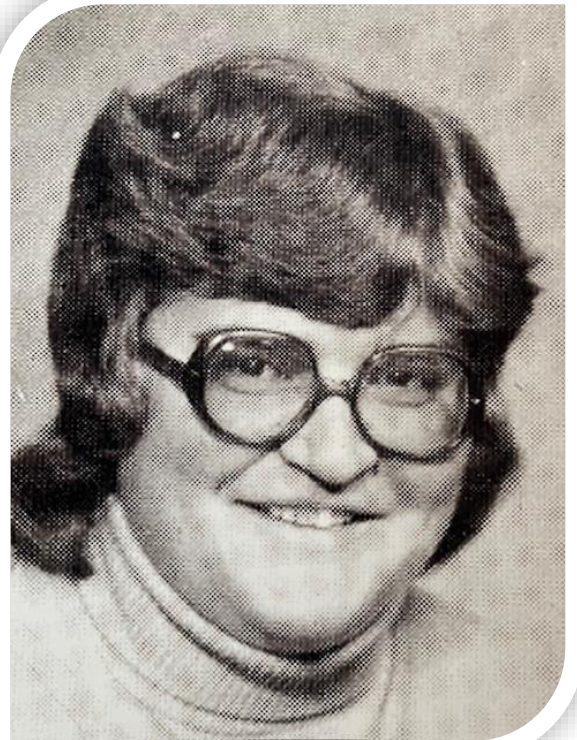
In all, her coaching tasks at CASHS included:

- Field hockey, 1970
- Basketball, 1972-77
- Softball, 1976-79
- Track & field, 1974-75
- Gymnastics, 1975

Even after retiring from coaching, Brown stayed involved in athletics as a PIAA track & field official. She was a timer for running events and a judge for the jumping events.

Brown was known as a compassionate, fair, prepared and funny person, who had a huge heart and would do anything for her students, athletes and co-workers.

Steph (VanBrakle) Prothro

In the history of athletics at Chambersburg, there may not have been a player who meant more to her team for her whole career than Stephanie (VanBrakle) Prothro.

Prothro was a dominant softball player for four years, from 1999 to 2002, for the Trojans, who were contenders for PIAA titles in each of her seasons.

In Prothro's four years at Chambersburg, the Trojan softball team compiled an almost unbelievable record of 106-6. The Trojans won District 3 championships in 2000, 2001 and 2002 and were the runners-up in 1999.

In the state tournament, Chambersburg lost once in the first round, the quarterfinals twice and the semifinals once, and three of those defeats were to Neshaminy.

In her senior season, Prothro was named the Gatorade Player of the Year in Pennsylvania.

Her career pitching statistics (Note: some of the statistics did not include her final game, a 3-0 loss to Neshaminy) were astounding. She had a 49-3 record and her earned run average was 0.18. She racked up 676 strikeouts. She hurled five perfect games and 5 no-hitters in her career and in one game she recorded all 21 outs via strikeout. At the plate, Prothro was nearly as spectacular. She had a career batting average of .396 with 92 runs batted in and 13 home runs.

In her senior season, Prothro allowed only 21 hits, 17 walks and 6 runs (4 earned) in 123.2 innings, and fanned 276 batters. She also batted .431 with 31 hits, 29 RBIs and 5 home runs.

Prothro also played volleyball and basketball and was the captain of each of those teams.

Her college career at the University of Alabama was also very successful. She made the All-SEC team in all four years with the Crimson Tide and was the SEC Pitcher of the Year in 2006.

Alabama won two SEC Tournaments and one regular season title with Prothro, and the Tide reached the NCAA College World Series three times. She was a second-team All-America honoree in 2005 and 2006.

While serving as the pitching coach for Alabama over 12 years, the Tide won an NCAA title in 2012, three SEC Tournaments and two SEC regular-season crowns.

Prothro was the head coach at Birmingham Southern for two years, at Samford for one year, and at Memphis for two years. She was recently named an assistant coach at the University of Florida. She and her husband Quentin have a son and a step-daughter.

Barry Carter

When he attended high school in Chambersburg, Barry Carter Sr. used his athletic skills to boost the performance of teams in four sports.

Carter played football and basketball, and in the spring, he competed in both baseball and track & field.

Carter, who is deceased, was a versatile member of the successful Chambersburg football, basketball and baseball teams, and competed in track & field.

In football, Carter was a running back who also threw the football, played standout defense at safety and held down the punting, kicking and kick return duties.

He was an honorable mention pick for the Big 33 football game and the Pa. All-State team.

In track & field, he held the school record in the broad jump and posted a time of 10 seconds in the 100-yard dash.

In baseball, he played shortstop, but also did some pitching. Carter also played for the Chambersburg team in American Legion ball and was named Most Valuable Player in the Legion all-star game at Connie Mack Stadium in Philadelphia.

Based on his performance, the New York Mets selected Carter as their first pick in the free agent baseball draft. He played for two years (1966-67) in the minor leagues for the Mets. He played for the semi-pro Chambersburg Maroons while still in high school.

After his baseball career was finished, Carter played semi-pro football with the Pottsville Maroons and the Chambersburg Cardinals. For many years, he was employed by JUMP (Joint Urban Manpower Program) as a roadway inspector in New York and Atlanta.

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Mitch Stahl

Mitch Stahl had the height and he had the athleticism, and when he mastered the skills of playing volleyball, he turned into a force.

Stahl, who was considered the top volleyball recruit in the nation after his senior year of playing for the Trojans, was chosen to be included in the inaugural class of the Chambersburg Athletics Hall of Fame.

In Stahl's junior season, he helped carry Chambersburg to a PIAA Class 3A state championship under coach Kirk Crouse. The Trojans lost only three times that year, all to Central Dauphin, but avoided the Rams at states and edged Pennridge in the final, 23-25, 25-20, 15-25, 25-23 and 15-11.

In that year, Stahl was named the PIAA Tournament Most Valuable Player, the Mid Penn Conference Player of the Year and the Pennsylvania Player of the Year.

In 2013, his senior year, Stahl was selected for the 10-man American Volleyball Coach Association's All-America team as an outside hitter. In his career, Stahl piled up 2,760 attacks, and had 1,432 kills, 252 block kills and 142 aces.

Stahl said he is grateful to the Frazer family – Bob, Kim, Ray and Tate – who encouraged him to get into volleyball and were influential early in his career, which didn't begin until he was a freshman. He also thanked his parents, Lisa and Tony, for their support.

In high school, Stahl was also a valuable member of the Trojan basketball team.

He played for four years at UCLA, one of the top volleyball schools in the country, then played for various professional teams in Europe.

The highlight of his post-college career was being named to the U.S. Olympic Volleyball Team and competing in the 2021 Tokyo Olympics. He competed for the men's national team from 2015-22.

Tom Brookens

Plenty of Chambersburg athletes have become professionals in a variety of sports, but none have had a pro career as long or successful as Tom Brookens.

Brookens was a Major League baseball player for 12 years, which included winning a World Series title with the Detroit Tigers in 1984.

Brookens played baseball for the Trojans in 1969-71, and he was one of a group of very good players, including his twin brother Tim and cousin Ike Brookens. Unfortunately, back then, there were no high school playoffs or all-state teams.

The American Legion baseball program was strong at that time. Chambersburg was very successful in that, and Brookens was named to the Legion East-West All-Star game three times, in 1970-72. He said one of his favorite memories was playing games in high school and Legion at Henninger Field.

Brookens went to college at Mansfield before the Tigers drafted him in 1975. He was called up to the majors in 1979 and played in Detroit through the 1988 season, which included the World Series season of 1984, with Brookens playing third base.

He closed out his career with one year as a New York Yankee and one as a Cleveland Indian.

In his career, Brookens batted .246, scored 477 runs, drove in 431 runs, belted 71 home runs and stole 86 bases. Perhaps his best season was in 1980, when he batted .275, and had 66 RBIs and 10 homers.

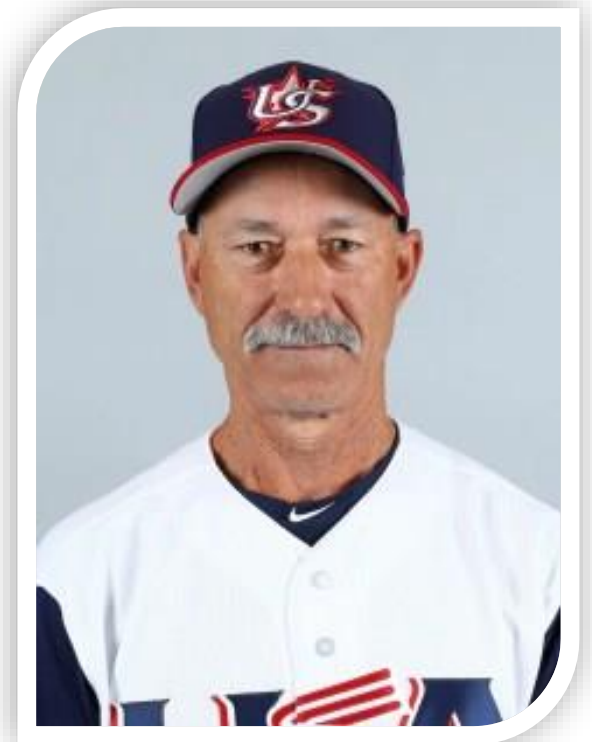
After the 1990 season, Brookens retired. But he returned to the Detroit organization in 2005 as a minor league manager for the Tigers for five seasons. He was named Midwest League's Manager of the Year in 2007.

In 2010, he was named to the Tigers' Major League staff and was the first base coach under Jim Leyland for three years and the third base coach for one. Detroit was the AL champion in 2012.

After retiring again, Brookens was asked to help Leyland run Team USA in the World Baseball Classic in 2017 and the team came through with a gold medal for the first time.

Brookens lives in the Fayetteville area with his wife Chris.

Ron Etter

This is how good Ron Etter was in his senior football season at Chambersburg: He was recruited by some 60 colleges to play football for them and the final five schools he chose from were Alabama, Nebraska, Notre Dame, Ohio State and Penn State.

Etter was a terror on both the offensive and defensive lines for the Trojans during his career, which was 1968-70.

Here is a list of some honors Etter collected following his senior football season in 1970, under coach Tom Carroll:

- Sunkist Prep All-American
- Scholastic Coach & Athlete All-American, and listed in top 100 players in the U.S.
- Pennsylvania All-State, on offense and defense
- Chambersburg Touchdown Club's Outstanding Football Player of Franklin County
- Chosen for the Pennsylvania Big 33 team

While at CASHS, Etter also lettered two years in track & field and one year in basketball.

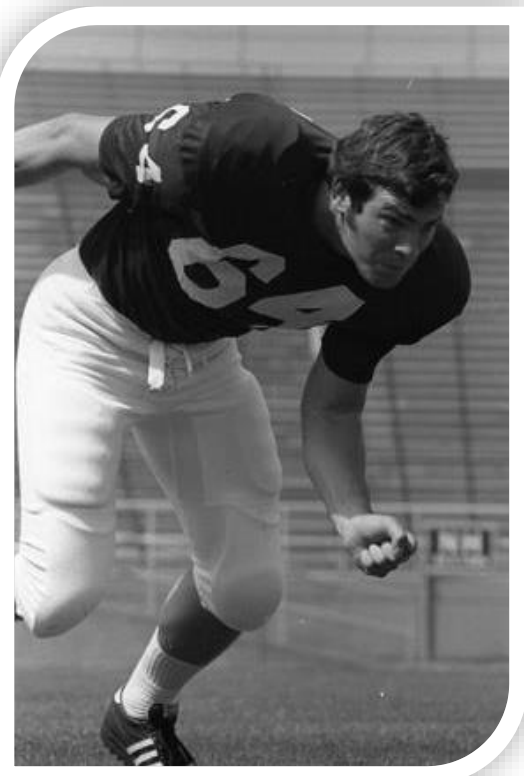
At Penn State, Etter played guard on the offensive line, and was undersized – 6-3 ½, 242 pounds – especially compared to today's standards. In his last three years for the Nittany Lions, he was on the second line of the depth chart.

During his time there, PSU played in 2 Cotton Bowls (1971, 1975), the 1972 Sugar Bowl and the 1974 Orange Bowl. The 1973 team was 12-0-0 and produced Heisman Trophy winner John Cappelletti.

After college Etter and his wife, Cathie Wood, moved to Perry County and Etter served for 30 years in the West Perry school district as a health & physical education teacher. He helped coach the high school and middle school football teams.

Etter said the highlights of his high school career were Coach Carroll announcing him as an All-American to the rest of the team, and receiving a Western Union telegram from coach Bob Devaney of Nebraska, asking him to come visit the Cornhuskers.

Tim Cook

Tim Cook could have been selected to the inaugural class of inductees for the new Chambersburg Athletics Hall of Fame as an athlete, or as a coach.

Put those two sides together, and add in that he was the first Trojan to win a PIAA state championship as an athlete and as a coach, and Cook had a very strong case for inclusion.

As an athlete at Chambersburg, Cook became a high-caliber distance runner. In his senior season, 1970, the Trojans had a strong cross-country team under coach Paul Kaiser, and Cook led the way by winning the District 3 title that fall and was the runner-up at the PIAA championships.

He also made his mark in track & field for CASHS, winning District 3 gold in the 1-mile race in 1970 and the 2-mile race in 1971. In PIAA meets, Cook placed third in the 1-mile in 1970 and then became a PIAA champion in the 2-mile event in 1971.

Cook competed for four years in track & field and cross country at The College of William & Mary, and was eventually inducted into the Tribe's Hall of Fame for helping their team place fourth at the NCAA Division I Championships.

He continued to run following graduation, and in 1997, won the John B. Kelly Cup as the state's outstanding athlete at the Keystone Games.

Cook, who was named to the South-Central PA Sports Hall of Fame, began his coaching career at Chambersburg in the fall 1976.

He coached the girls cross country team for 26 years and compiled a sterling record of 225-31 (.879), with 12 league titles and 9 District 3 championships. Trojan teams collected PIAA team championships in 1977 and 1989.

Cook also was the head coach for the girls track & field team, and in 25 years, his teams put up 194 wins and 34 defeats (.851), with 10 league crowns and one district title. In 1990, the Trojans' 4 x 400 relay team were state champions, and in 1997, Marvarine Campbell earned the PIAA title in the javelin throw.

As the distance coach, he was also the mentor for Doug Walter, who won PIAA gold in 1986 in the 800.

Unfortunately, Cook's coaching career came to an end when he and his wife Sue were killed in an auto accident in late 2002.

Marshay Ryan

If you were to gather up all of the state gold medals that Marshay Ryan won in her high school career and placed them in the sun, about the only thing brighter than them would be her charismatic smile.

Ryan is perhaps the most decorated athlete in Chambersburg sports history and she was a natural choice to be included in the inaugural class of the Chambersburg Athletics Hall of Fame.

Ryan, under the tutelage of CASHS jumping coach Bob Walker, piled up seven state champion gold medals – 3 PIAA gold in the long jump (2011, '12, '13), 2 PIAA gold in the triple jump ('12, '13) and 2 golds at the Pa. Track & Field Coaches Association indoor states (2013, long and triple jump).

In her senior season, she was named the PA Gatorade Athlete of the Year in track & field and was also the PTFCA Athlete of the Year.

In 2012, Ryan competed in the New Balance Outdoor Nationals and was the national runner-up in both the long and triple jump.

She still holds school records for the long (18-7.75) and triple (40-11.5) jumps, and collected numerous gold medals at the Mid Penn Conference and District 3 championships.

Ryan said she thanks God, for giving her the talent to be used for His glory; her parents, grandparents and godparents, for instilling in her the values, morals, work ethic and love to be the best she could be; and her coaches, especially coach Walker.

Ryan, who also captained the Trojan girls basketball team, said her signing day, when she accepted a scholarship offer from Auburn University, was her favorite moment in high school.



In college, Ryan became a three-time All-American — in both indoor and outdoor track & field — for the Tigers, was a team captain and owns Auburn's freshman record in the triple jump.

Ryan was a USA Juniors National runner-up in 2014 in the triple jump and represented her country at the Junior Worlds, where she placed seventh. In 2016, she competed in the U.S. Olympic Trials and placed 16th.

Ryan was inducted into the Pennsylvania Track & Field Hall of Fame in 2019.

1977 Girls Cross Country Team

Being the first to achieve a tangible goal can be a source of great pride.

Being the first to win a state championship, well, that will put you in the history books. If and when a history of Chambersburg sports is ever compiled, the Trojan girls cross country team of 1977 will have its place marked as the first Chambersburg team to ever bring home a PIAA team championship trophy.

The PIAA had held its first state championship cross country meet in 1976, and the Trojans finished third under coach Tim Cook, so the talent was evident.

When the teams gathered at the 2.2-mile course on the Penn State Blue golf course on Nov. 5, Chambersburg was one of the favorites, although State College and Council Rock had bettered them in regular season invitationals.

But on this day, the Trojans pulled out the win, scoring 59 points to 64 for Council Rock, the defending champion, and 109 for the Little Lions.

Three factors led to the championship – grouping, kicking and a freshman.

Chambersburg did not place a runner in the top 10. But it did put four runners among the next 10 – Debbie Keyser (11th, 13:13), Staci Tolbert (12th, 13:16), Angie Bell (14th, 13:18) and Maureen Navin (20th, 13:26).

Chrystal Kaiser was the other runner who counted in the scoring, and she finished in 14:04 and was 45th. The other runner was Carol Dudney, who was 75th in 14:40.

The time gap between the Trojans' top four runners was 13 seconds, and only 51 seconds for the top five.

Another factor was the finishing kick of most of the team. Cook said that with 200 yards to go, had they done the scoring then, his team would not have won. But most of the team was able to pass several runners in front of them and lower their team score.

Finally, the improvement of Kaiser, a freshman, was a factor. In a dual meet two weeks before, nine State College runners had finished in front of Kaiser. In the state meet, only three Little Lions placed ahead of her.

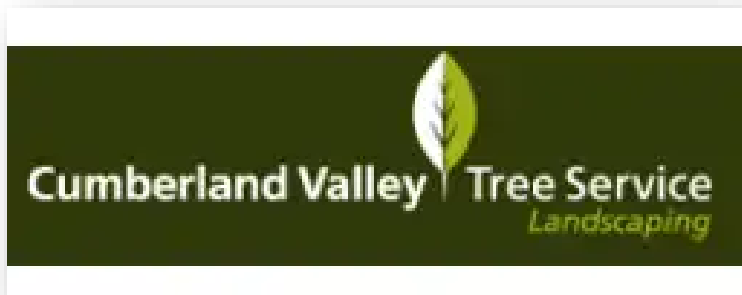
